The Principal's Message

HABITS WHICH EDUCATE



Education is not the hardiest of plants. It flourishes with cultivation, but withers and dies when unattended. It never reaches maturity, its life and vitality depending upon unending growth. Students think of it as something they can get hold of, acquire, possess. They acquire a body of useful knowledge and of fruitful ideas. Then they graduate. They are educated. Perhaps after that they are satisfied with activities which are not educative.

Then what happens? For answer to that question one need but associate with a number of men and women, five, ten, or fifteen years after the school doors have closed behind them. Many of them have forsaken the habits of school days. They no longer read that which inspires, no longer gain fresh information, no longer acquire knowledge and reach in the direction of wisdom. They have lost themselves in the common herd. It is the duty of teachers to see to it that young people do not go the way of mediocrity and that those capable of continuing education shall not miss it. How can this be achieved?

It will be achieved if students are led to acquire habits of reading, thinking, conversing and acting, which are educative, which bring them to a realistic understanding of life and its problems; habits which educate them as the days go by and which are likely to be continued after the school years are over. Reading of texts and acquiring a body of useful knowledge is essential and must not be neglected, but the texts will be discarded upon graduation. Education which consists of text reading will stop short on Commencement day.

But the student who, along with the necessary text book background work, is acquiring the habit of looking upon the contemporary scene with understanding eyes is building for permanence. If during his school years, he gets into the way of reading the best of magazines and books which portray that scene, if he thus becomes accustomed to a contact with the moving current of the world's best thought—if he does that while in school he will gain habits likely to be continued and habits which, if continued, will insure an unending education.

This defeat put the conference championship into a three way tie between Eagle River, Minocqua, and Laona.




