
Through his many years of service, our school has always maintained the highest standards that only his patience and guidance could achieve. He has been an excellent teacher and in past years, an athletic coach.







CLASS HISTORY

On September 5, 1952, 77 green little Freshmen meekly walked through the door of Eagle River High School. Thirty-six of us were girls, and forty-one were boys. Mr. Herman Freymiller took us in hand as our class advisor and we elected our class officers, who were: President, Tom Gaffney; Vice President, Mark Case; Secretary and Treasurer, Larry Sparks. Student Council members were Gary Dean and Ione Hrbacek and our homecoming queen candidate was Rose La Crosse. We were fully accepted by the older students after our initiation, which took place on October 17, 1952.

September 8, 1953, 73 Sophomores, consisting of thirty-four girls and thirty-nine boys, confidently re-entered the familiar halls of E.R.H.S. Our class advisor this year was Mr. Robert Dehlinger. Bill Williams was elected President and Gary Dean Vice President. Joan Nelson became Secretary and Judy Goldsworthy, Treasurer. We were represented on the Student Council by Judy Hoover and Tom Renk. We were proud that our candidate, Joan Nelson, became Homecoming Queen!

On September 7, 1954, 80 Juniors slowly ascended the steps of Eagle River High School, this time thirty-two girls and fifty-eight boys. Mr. Solomon became our class advisor and director of our class play, "Dear Ruth," which starred Judy Hoover and Gary Dean. For our class officers we elected Tom Renk as President, Mike Giese as Vice President, Ione Hrbacek as Secretary, and Treasurer, Marlyn Hall. Tom Renk became king of our Junior Prom, "Melody of Love," choosing Margaret Garbisch to reign as queen. Again the class of "56" shone—the Homecoming Queen, Ione Hrbacek, was the candidate for the Junior Class.

September 6, 1955, 65 battle-scarred Seniors bombarded the old ivy covered walls. Miss Austin was our class advisor. Mike Giese was elected President; Bill Wolter, Vice President; Lynn Reed, Secretary; and Judy Goldsworthy, Treasurer. On the Student Council we elected Sonia Weber and Bill Gensler. Marlyn Hall was elected to the tremendous job of editing the annual. Our triumph came when Connie Croker was elected Homecoming Queen. We attended Baccalaureate on May 21st and our banquet night on May 23rd. Our final glory came the evening of May 25th when sixty-three almighty Seniors received their well deserved diplomas at graduation ceremonies!




