



When Mr. Brocker leaves ERHS at the end of this year to pursue his new vocation, the best wishes and sincere thanks of the class of 1958 will go with him.



“The Challenge of Sputnik”

The Soviet satellite launchings presented a great challenge to our country. The military strength which these launchings demonstrate has been of great concern to us. However, our military strength can be no greater than our educational system. That is why the American educational system is being subjected today to one of the most severe periods of criticism in our history.

That is as it should be. Because no matter how good an educational system we think we have, we should always strive to make it better. We should not overlook its many desirable features and make the mistake of reacting to the Soviet challenge to such an extreme, that we lose these features. We do not want an unbalanced society which would be the result if too much emphasis is placed on scientific materialism. We want to develop not only one phase of the intellect, but we want our students to be well rounded and responsible future parents and citizens.

To my mind, it isn't entirely a matter of more classrooms, more teachers, more schools and more scientists. We shall miss the target completely if we do not recognize that our major problem is quality and not quantity, of education.

To have better schools we must begin by having better teachers. We must give teachers the salary, prestige and backing which will attract the best minds to the profession. We must insist upon work and achievement; parents at home must stand behind these demands.

We must recognize also that what and how students are taught is as important as by whom and where.

Let us examine three main criticisms that have been made of our educational system. First that there are too many soft subjects and not enough tough, challenging topics that develop the mind. Any mental work that lacks challenge, leads to an underdeveloped brain and a weak intellect.

Another criticism is that too often we do not challenge our superior students. Even when they are taking these so-called tough subjects, they find that the level of teaching is geared to the least gifted student. We need to seek out these superior students, to inspire them, and to challenge them to learn up to their fullest capacities in order to make them of utmost use to society.

Perhaps the most fundamental weakness in many of our schools is that students are not allowed to face the challenge of failure. Passing is automatic. Educators say that this is the democratic approach and that it is more important for students to learn to adjust to one another than to demand rigorous achievement. I do not think that this idea measures up to the realities of life. When students leave school, they will find that success is not automatic. In the hard competition of life they will have to face failure and hard realities.

It is good to have the democracy in our educational system but it is also necessary to have backbone standards and guidance. Young people want and need guidance. Even the brash of them knows that he has not the experience and wisdom to face the world unaided.

American education will be no better or no worse than the individual American parent wants it to be. What is needed is a national awakening not only to what the needs are in education but also to where the primary responsibility lies.

CLASS HISTORY

Starting our "Glorious Adventure" on September 7th, 1954, seventy-nine alert and intelligent (or so we thought) freshmen walked into the ivy-covered halls of Eagle River High School. After we became orientated, we met as a group for the first time with our class advisor, Mr. Freymiller. We elected our class officers who led us through the first hectic year. They consisted of president, John Dussault; vice president, Chet Myers; secretary, Kathy Bloom; and treasurer, Bonnie Kauzlaric. Student council members were Pat Kaminski and Lloyd Karenke. This year we lost Margaret Blohm, Darlene Hazelbauer, Jim Hazen, Stanley Petts and Janice Synstad. We gained Alice Johnson. We were fully accepted into the student body after a hilarious initiation November 12th.

Beginning our Sophomore year on September 6th, 1955, with seventy-five students, we felt sure we could hurdle any obstacle which crossed our path. However, we still found a big job ahead of us. This year we lost Joanne Guerin, John and Lance Moorman, while we gained Mary McDonald and Dick Grandstrom. Wesley Pogel was with us for about six months during this year. Many successful activities took place this year under the leadership of Chet Myers, president; Tom Tuttle, vice president; Toni Dewyer, secretary; and Pat Kaminski as treasurer. Representing us on the student council was Charlotte Kivisto and Roger Morey. Our biggest event was the initiation of those in the class below us.

"Moon Glow" was the theme of the beautiful Junior Prom, and was the high point of the year. Reigning over that year's ball was Tom Rateau as king, and his lovely queen, Sherry Farrell. Tom, of course, was president during this year, and had as his assistants, Junior Ludwig, vice president; Janice Dean, secretary; and Kay Genzmer, treasurer. Our number of students dropped from 74 to 66. We lost James Bradley, James Healy, Harold Johnson, Joan Klemp, Bonnie Kristo, Jacqueline Merkel, Jane Peters, Bob Ratliff, Sue Williams, Ben Logan and Roger Morey. Gained during that year were Carolyn and Marilyn Regenfuss and Fred Hafer. Students attending just the Junior year were Jon Wood, Louis Stimac and Terry McPeak. Jon was elected to the student council along with Charlotte Kivisto.

September 6th, 1957, started our last year of companionship together. Leading us through our final year were John Gaffney, president; Kathy Bloom, vice president; Shirley Weber, secretary; and Carol Scharf, treasurer. Representing us on the student council were Tom Tuttle and Toni Dewyer.

During this commencement year we planned and carried out many events and activities, the most important of these being the planning and publishing of the annual and graduation. This year we lost David Knox and Ralph Lilly, while gaining Betsy Crandall. Marilyn Micheli graduated at mid-term after attending a semester here. Baccalaureate Services were held on May 18th, the banquet on the 21st and the end to a successful four years on commencement night, May 23rd. Although we shall be scattered far and wide over the earth and will probably not see each other again, we will hold one thing in common; our four years spent together in Eagle River High School.
