

DEDICATION







The 1964-65 school year proved to be a fruitful one in administration. In addition to the already bountiful curriculum, a new course art, was instructed by Mr. Invie. Retail merchandising, a one-semester course taught by Mr. Check, was another new class. To increase the value of foreign languages, a third year of French was offered to those interested. First and second year Latin were offered concurrently, giving Laeti Latini its largest enrollment since its inception. There are now more class hours of behind-the-wheel training to enable more students to learn the skills of driving.

Remodeling was done in the boys physical education locker rooms. Over the Christmas holidays, the upper school corridors were painted. New lighting systems were also installed in the halls.

In the April election the high school board was increased to five members to enable even more capable handling of school affairs. There is a study committee at work to see whether the school districts of the area should be changed, possibly to a K-12 arrangement.

HISTORY

Our high school career began on September 1, 1961, as the class of 1965 became official "greenies." Our business affairs were capably handled by our president, Allan Kauth; vice-president, Pat Koenitzer; secretary, JoMary Hendrickson; and treasurer, Christine Froelich. Our class advisors included Miss Marlene Parkhurst, Mrs. Richard Hansen, and Mr. Charles Hanke. Pat Koenitzer and Jack Alward were selected to represent our class in the Student Council. Chosen by Hi-Times as reporters were Jeanette Yadro, Faye Bernardo, JoMary Hendrickson, and Joe Olk. JoMary Hendrickson was selected above the other classes' candidates to reign over the Rotary Club carnival and dance. Bill Ferguson and Don Bradford displayed their outstanding athletic ability, thus they lettered in football and golf, respectively, and were accepted as members of the "E" Club. Chosen as cheerleaders were Pat Koenitzer and JoMary Hendrickson.

September 4, 1962, marked the beginning of our sophomore year, and we were assured that our "green spots" had finally worn off. Joe Olk, our president, directed our business meetings with the assistance of vice-president, Jack Alward; secretary, Veryl Bandow; and treasurer, Jim Snedden. Coach Ernie Johnson, Mrs. Doris Check, Mr. Stephen Anderson, and Mr. George Simon were our sophomore class advisors. Our Student Council representatives were Linda Ritzer and Immanuel Johnson. Joe Olk, Allan Kauth, Jeanette Yadro, and Marcia Bittenbender were elected to the Aquila Chapter of the National Honor Society on the basis of outstanding character, leadership, scholarship, and service qualities. "Time Out for Charlie," our sophomore one-act play, was presented by Jack Alward, Judy Sheppard, Joe Chuckel, Kathy McClone, Mike Heaton, Faye Bernardo, Linda Ritzer, Jeanette Yadro, and Kathy Kazda, under the direction of Mrs. Check. Arnie Grubel, who lettered in football and baseball, Jim Oerichbauer in golf, and Mike Rosner in basketball, were accepted as "E" Club members. Dennis Budde who served in the capacity of basketball manager also received his letter. The champion of the annual Pep Club free-throw contest was Joe Olk.

On September 3, 1963, we officially became upperclassmen. Joe Olk was again elected president, which meant that he was to reign over the Junior Prom as King. Vice-president was Joe Chuckel; secretary, Pat Koenitzer; and treasurer, Kathy McClone. Our class advisors were Mrs. Jean Wollum, Mrs. Georgia Hanke, and Mr. Lawrence Ladwig. Members of our class chosen as Student Council representatives were Christine Froelich and Jim Snedden. Judie Sheppard, Rise Orlich, Pat Koenitzer, and JoMary Hendrickson were selected to serve on the National Honor Society. "Puff Scores Again," our junior class Homecoming float, captured first place in the Homecoming float contest sponsored by the Pep Club. Our class rings, which were the first standard rings in Eagle River High School, arrived in early December, much to our delight. "Sunday Costs Five Pesos," our junior class play, directed by Miss Joan Duff and presented by Sandee McQuire, Lynn Abney, Kathy McClone, Marcia Bittenbender, and Chiuck Tienhaara, won first place in the local one-act play contest and received a "B" rating at the district meet. Christine Froelich, Rise Orlich, and Jack Alward were selected as editors for the 1965 Northern Trail. The high point of our junior year was the prom which was decorated in accord with the theme "Evening in Paris." Joe Olk and Kathy McClone reigned over the gala event with their court. Christine Froelich and Kathy McClone were chosen to attend Badger Girls' State, while Jack Alward, Chuck Bonson, Arnie Grubel, Allan Kauth, and Joe Olk went to Badger Boys' State. Football lettermen and "E" Club members were Chuck Bonson, Gib Garrou, Jim Oerichbauer, Joe Olk, Mike Rosner, Jim Snedden, and Earl Thomas. Those who lettered in basketball were Arnie Grubel, Allan Kauth, and Joe Olk. Baseball letters were awarded to Jerry Brassard, Joe Olk, and Mike Rosner. Mike Heaton who served as manager for the football squad also received a letter in his junior year.

We finally became almighty seniors on September 4, 1964, as the termination of our high school days swiftly approached. The class officers we elected were president, Bill Ferguson; vice-president, Mike Rosner; secretary, Joe Olk; and treasurer, Allan Kauth. Miss Esther Austin, Mr. Ken Check, Mrs. Pat Invie, and Mr. Win Abney headed the list as our class advisors. Our senior class was represented in the Student Council by Jeanette Yadro and Joe Chuckel. Jim Oerichbauer and Linda Ritzer were selected King and Queen of the 1964 Homecoming festivities. The dance was decorated according to the theme "In the Misty Moonlight." "In the Shadows," the senior one-act play was presented to the public by Faye Bernardo, Chuck Tienhaara, Judie Sheppard, John Davis, Lynn Abney, and Jack Alward, under the direction of Mrs. Pat Invie. King and Queen of the annual FHA Christmas Dance were Joe Chuckel and Pat Koenitzer. One of the high points of our senior year was our 27-6 victory over Three Lakes in the championship football game. With that determining game in our favor, the Eagle River Eagles were the N.L.C. Champs of 1964! Senior football lettermen included Jack Alward, Jerry Brassard, Stan Casey, Joe Chuckel, Allan Kauth, Walt Mellenberger, and manager, Mike Dobbe. Those who lettered in golf in their senior year were Jack Alward, Joe Chuckel, and Allan Kauth.

Selected for their outstanding athletic ability to the first team of the All-Conference football squad were Bill Ferguson and Joe Olk. Those receiving Honorable Mention were Chuck Bonson, Gib Garrou, Arnie Grubel, Allan Kauth, Jim Oerichbauer, and Earl Thomas.






The Saturnalia, comparable to a Roman Christmas party, was held on December 21.

Through such categories as public address, extemporaneous speaking, interpretive reading of prose and poetry, memorized declamations, four-minute speech, original and non-original oratory, and play reading, students are given the opportunity to compete with participants from other schools, using some of the best literature, writings, and current information available.

At the local forensic contest held on February 25, 1965, twenty-nine students competed in seven fields. 






